Incorporating Buffalo Meat Into the Schools' Lunch Menu

The InterTribal Buffalo Council (ITBC) represents 62 Tribes throughout 19 states. The role of ITBC, as established by its memberships, is to act as a facilitator in coordinating education and training programs, developing marketing strategies, coordinating the transfer of buffalo from national parks and tribal lands, and providing technical assistance to its membership in developing sound management plans that will help each tribal herd become a successful and self-sufficient program. As of today, there are 13 schools that have incorporated buffalo meat into their school lunch program through an ITBC project.
