Announcements

EOP: Improving Public Safety and Criminal Justice for Native Americans and Addressing the Crisis of Missing or Murdered Indigenous People

Executive Order directing the Attorney General, Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), the Secretary of the Interior, and other leaders of executive department agencies, to take a series of actions in consultation with tribal governments and communities to address issues around violence against Native Americans, including missing or murdered Indigenous people. Among other things, this executive order directs the Secretary of HHS to develop a comprehensive plan to support prevention efforts that reduce risk factors for victimization of Native Americans and increase protective factors, including by enhancing the delivery of services for Native American victims and survivors, their families, and advocates.

HHS: Extension of the Deadline for Nomination of Delegates; Center for Indigenous Innovation and Health Equity Tribal Advisory Committee; Solicitation of Nominations for Delegates

Notice from the Department of Health and Human Services extending the deadline for the submission of nominations for the Center for Indigenous Innovation and Health Equity Tribal Advisory Committee (CIIHE TAC). CIIHE TAC will support research, education, service, and policy development advancing Indigenous solutions that ultimately address health disparities in American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) and Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (NHPI) populations. Nominations are now due by January 7, 2022. More info here.

YouthBuild Grants

Grants to organizations providing pre-apprenticeship services that support education, occupational skills training, and employment services for at-risk youth, ages 16 to 24, while performing meaningful work and service to their communities. The YouthBuild program model contains wrap-around services such as mentoring, trauma-informed care, personal counseling, and employment. Eligibility includes "Any Indian and Native American entities eligible for grants under Section 166 of WIOA"

Ohiyesa Premedical Program

A year-long educational program designed to engage and support Native American Tribal and/or community college students interested in pursuing a healthcare career, with a program focus on the physician pathway. The program includes quarterly virtual group meetings, individual meetings with faculty sponsors and mentors, and a 3 week on-site summer program in Boston at the Brigham and Women's Hospital.

Supportive Services for Veteran Families Program

Grants to private nonprofit organizations and consumer cooperatives that provide supportive services for very low-income veterans and their families residing in or transitioning to permanent housing. Supportive services grants will be equitably distributed across geographic regions, including rural communities and tribal lands.

Racial Equity in Postpartum Care Challenge: Innovative Methods to Improve Postpartum Care for Black or African and American Indian/Alaska Native Women

A prize competition to identify effective programs that can address equity of postpartum care for Black or African American and American Indian/Alaska Native beneficiaries enrolled in Medicaid or CHIP. An emphasis is on follow-up care for conditions associated with morbidity and mortality in the later postpartum period, including diabetes, postpartum depression, postpartum anxiety, hypertension, and substance use disorders.

Financial assistance to support projects that improve access to healthy foods in underserved areas, create and preserve quality jobs, and revitalize low income communities.
